

Other news:

During the latter part of the month of June, several members of the supervisors inspected the township roads for the purpose of making decisions relative to summer paving and maintenance projects.

Township Police services at Eagle Lake were approved at the same rate as last year. NOTE: Eagle Lake police services are contracted.

Also at the June meeting, the Board discussed the application for renewal of the air quality permit for Eureka Stone Quarry. The township secretary was instructed to contact DEP listing township concerns related to the quarry operations.

At the July meeting a resident of Big Bass Lake expressed concerns regarding storm water management on Lot 5 in the Industrial Park. The supervisors took her comments under advisement.

It was reported that the sign placement project is about 70% complete and hopefully will be finished by fall.

The Board expressed appreciation to Gabe Ramos and other scouts for the fine work accomplished on the trail system behind the Senior Center. The walking trail has been refurbished with gravel and several benches. It is free to all residents.

Bids for the sale of the township Humvee were opened at the August meeting. The bid was awarded to a representative of Camelback Ski area for approximately \$22,000.

The township plans to hold a hearing on an ordinance being developed to crack down on businesses that discharge wastewater and grease into the sewer system.

At the August meeting, the supervisors agreed to purchase speed bumps for the Moffat Estate and pay off \$250,000 in debt on the pavilion. They also authorized the township engineer to look into the construction of a new salt shed on township property.

Halloween History



Halloween has its origins in the ancient Celtic festival known as Samhain pronounced "sah-win". The festival of Samhain is a celebration of the end of the harvest season in Gaelic culture. Samhain was a time used by the ancient pagans to take stock of supplies and prepare for winter. The festival would frequently involve bonfires. It is believed that the fires attracted insects to the area which attracted bats to the area.

The word Halloween is a shortening of All Hallows' Evening also known as Hallowe'en or All Hallows' Eve. Traditional activities include trick-or-treating, bonfires, costume parties, visiting "haunted houses" and carving jack-o-lanterns. Irish and Scottish immigrants carried versions of the tradition to North America in the nineteenth century.

Part of the history of Halloween is Halloween costumes. The practice of dressing up in costumes and begging door to door for treats on holidays goes back to the Middle Ages. Trick-or-treating resembles the late medieval practice of "souling," when poor folk would go door to door on Hallowmas (November 1), receiving food in return for prayers for the dead on All Souls Day (November 2). It originated in Ireland and Britain, although similar practices for the souls of the dead were found as far south as Italy.

What causes leaves to change colors?

In autumn, the days get shorter and the temperatures get cooler. The sun doesn't warm the leaves as directly or intensely as it did during

spring and summer. In these shorter, cooler days, the process of making food within the leaves ceases. As this occurs, the leaves use the food they've stored throughout the summer. This causes the leaves' green pigment to become less dominant, and gives other colors an opportunity to be displayed.

Weather affects both the leaves' color intensity and its duration. Ideal conditions for spectacular coloring are a warm, dry summer followed by a rainy autumn. In autumn, warm, sunny days with cool nights trigger brilliant color formation. An early frost lessens the intensity of red. Rainy or overcast days intensify the brilliancy of color. A cool, clear day is always best for viewing.

Thanksgiving

The Pilgrims set ground at Plymouth Rock on December 11, 1620. Their first winter was

devastating. At the beginning of the following fall, they had lost 46 of the original 102 who sailed on the Mayflower, but the harvest of 1621 was a bountiful one. The remaining colonists decided to celebrate with a feast including 91 natives who had helped the Pilgrims survive their first year. It is believed that the Pilgrims would not have made it through the year without the help of the natives. The feast was more of a traditional English harvest festival than a true "thanksgiving" observance. It lasted three days.

It was not certain that wild turkey was part of the feast. However, it is certain that they had venison. (The term turkey was used by the pilgrims to mean any sort of wild fowl.) It is also unlikely that the first feast included pumpkin pie and since the supply of flour was depleted, there was no bread or pastries. But the feast did include fish, berries, lobsters, dry fruit, venison, and plums.

Enjoy your Thanksgiving dinner and take a moment to remember the hardships of our first settlers.

Commonly Asked Legal Questions

1. What is my liability if my credit card is lost or stolen?

Nothing, if the card is used after you report it lost or stolen. Use the toll free number for the credit card company and follow up your phone call with a confirmatory letter. If the card is used before you report it, Federal Law limits your liability to \$50.00 provided that you do report the loss or theft within a reasonable time, usually 30 days. (Source: Federal Fair Credit Billing Act)

2. What is my liability for lost or stolen ATM or Debit Card?

Again, nothing if you report the loss or theft before any unauthorized charges or withdrawals. If you miss that opportunity but you report the loss or theft within two business days, your liability is limited to \$50.00. However, if you report after two

business days but within 60 calendar days of the mailing of your statement, your maximum liability can be up to \$500.00. If you fail to report within 60 calendar days of your statement, you can be liable for all charges made on your debit card and all money withdrawn on an ATM account. (Source: Federal Electronic Fund Transfer Act)

3. What if someone makes unauthorized purchases using my debit card number, but the card is not lost of stolen? You are not liable if you report within 60 days of your statement.

4. What is my liability for lost or stolen checks?

Federal Law does not limit your loss for identity theft or forgery, but the law in Pennsylvania and most states could hold your bank liable for honoring a forgery. However, if the bank can show that you did not use due care in protecting your checks from theft or misuse, the bank could avoid reimbursing you. (Source: Pennsylvania Uniform Commercial Code)
