Reminder.....

Please be extra cautious during your morning and afternoon commutes. Watch your speeds & children waiting along the roadside for their buses. Do <u>not</u> try to outrun the school bus's lights just because you are running late, and remember, there are <u>substantial fines and a loss of license</u> if you pass a bus that is using its flashing red lights! They may not be your children but they are somebody's children! Let's keep them all safe!





It's clean up time again! Our annual spring clean up will be held on <u>Friday, May 16th & Saturday, May 17th from 8am—5pm ONLY</u>! (There will **not** be any collections taken on Sunday!) Permits will be available for township residents only starting on March 17th at the Municipal Office (Moffat Estate) from 8am-4pm, Monday-Friday. Your Township Supervisors are encouraging everyone to remove unsightly junk and debris from their properties!

- ⇒ You **MUST** have a permit to discard debris. One permit will be issued to each property owner.
- ⇒ The property **CANNOT** be a vacant lot or commercial property and the property owner must personally pick up their own permit.
- ⇒ Permits will be limited to 2 trips of junk and related items (permit will be checked carefully). Any additional trips will be charged \$25.00 per load.
- ⇒ To ensure that no non-residents are bringing debris to the clean-up, the Police Department will inspect and enforce all permits.
- ⇒ With the exception of tires, the clean-up is free of charge. ALL tires must be removed from their rims. Fees for tires are:

\$3.00 per car tire

\$6.00 per light truck tire

\$20.00 per heavy truck tire

- ⇒ <u>THE FOLLOW ITEMS WILL NOT BE TAKEN FOR CLEAN-UP</u>: Hazardous waste, gasoline, kerosene, paint, paint cans, oil, oil containers, combustible fuels, building materials & household garbage.
- Please remember to enter the Clean-up area from Dorantown Road (located behind the Covington Fire Department) and exit via Route 502.

From Your Supervisors.....

The Supervisors:

- ⇒ Approved replacement of gutters and downspouts on the mansion.
- ⇒ Approved the purchase of two rifle optic systems for the Police Department.
- ⇒ Accepted the resignation of Charles (Bucky) Lindner and appointed William Fells to finish his term on the Board of Supervisors.
- ⇒ Reviewed the employee pension system at an advertised October meeting.
- ⇒ Adopted the township budget with **NO** increase in taxes for the 14th year in a row.
- ⇒ Approved the replacement of two doors at the Senior Center.
- ⇒ Considered plans to build an antiskid containment facility on Covington Twp. Property. However, the township recently learned they will be able to operate from the state facility (Route 307 & I380). It was estimated that a separate facility would have cost in excess of \$100,000.
- ⇒ In July, they agreed to donate \$3,000 to the NP Public Library and review the donation on an annual bases.
- ⇒ After much discussion, they agreed to approve the traffic signal renovations at the intersection of SR435 & SR502.
- ⇒ Agreed to extend the police chief's contract (Bernie Klocko) for a period of three years.
- ⇒ On January 6, 2014 the board held a reorganization meeting and reappointed David Petrosky as Chairman; Tom Yerke as Vice-Chairman.
- ⇒ The Director of Public Works was instructed to review cost estimates regarding the paving of Sanko Road & parts of Union Mill Road.
- ⇒ Approved the pavilion rental for a jazz concert hosted by the NP Cultural Society at no cost.
- ⇒ Accepted a \$10,000 award from Lackawanna County to be used on enclosing the pavilion.
- ⇒ In addition, the township has also applied for a larger Economic Development Grant which will enable the township to complete the pavilion enclosure.

COMMONLY ASKED LEGAL QUESTIONS

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Am I responsible for the safety of people on my property?

An owner of land, or an occupier of land, is required to use reasonable care in maintaining and in using the property. Negligence or carelessness is defined as the failure to use the degree of ordinary care which a reasonable person should use. The failure to use reasonable care may make the owner liable for any resulting damage to one who is lawfully on the

property. Additionally, on who owns or occupies land in a developed or residential area has a duty to make reasonable inspections of the property and to correct any conditions that are unreasonably dangerous to others.

What is my responsibility for my sidewalks?

Someone in possession of land with sidewalks used by the public has all of the general duties to avoid negligence and is subject to the Pennsylvania doctrine known as the "Hills and Ridges Rule". That means that if the defendant property owner or possessor knew or should have known of the existence of an accumulation of snow or ice in ridges or elevations of such size as to constitute a danger to pedestrians, the property owner or possessor could be liable if a pedestrian was caused to fall due to this dangerous accumulation of snow or ice.

Is there a duty to a trespasser on my property?

Even if someone is a trespasser on the property, the owner or occupier of the land still has a duty to refrain from reckless or intentional misconduct that could inure the trespasser. A trespasser is someone who would be on the property without any permission, right, lawful authority or express or implied invitation or consent.

What is an "attractive nuisance"?

Over the years, Pennsylvania Law has developed a doctrine concerning the duty of care to trespassing children. Even if the child is a trespasser, the property owner or possessor could still be liable if it was known or should have been known that the minor child was likely to trespass and if a dangerous condition presenting an unreasonable risk of injury was known or should have been known. If this risk of injury could have been eliminated at a moderate cost and effort then there is a duty to use reasonable care to eliminate the danger or otherwise protect the minor child from an anticipated injury.



Reverence for the Mothers....

May 14, 1905 Anna Jarvis's mother dies.

Anna Jarvis of Grafton, West Virginia was devoted to her mother. Seven of her eleven siblings had died young, and the mother had clung to the survivors, especially Anna. After her mother's death, Jarvis began an impassioned crusade for a day to honor all mothers. Eventually, she devoted herself exclusively to her cause.

She began in her hometown with a special service on the anniversary of her mother's death and subsequently embarked on a letter-writing campaign. Finally, on May 9, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday in May as Mothers Day, urging citizens to fly the American Flag "as a public expression of our love and reverence for the mother's of our country". It is the only national observance to commemorate someone's death.

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oncerns Over Tick Borne Diseases


In a previous newsletter we talked about some of the growing concerns over tick related diseases. Although they are barely perceptible to the naked eye, the tick bite infects many thousands of adults and children which can leave them with debilitating and sometimes fatal diseases with Lyme disease being the most prevalent. It is estimated that 300,000 Americans each year are affected!

As you may know, Lyme disease includes symptoms of fever, headache, and fatigue, and can lead to neurological impairments including forms of meningitis and encephalitis. However, as more becomes known about the disease causing tick, other more serious problems are coming forth. Unfortunately patients often do not realize that they have been bitten (not everyone will find the "bulls eye" sign) and doctors do not always properly diagnose the infection quickly or accurately!

With the warm weather approaching and as more children and adults spend increased time outside, it is important to be aware of the

- There is no vaccine for Lyme disease or other tick-borne illnesses.
- 2. Repellents containing DEET may help keep ticks away, however, they are not foolproof.
- 3. Try to avoid walking through thick brush or grass in wooded areas.
- 4. Inspect your clothes and body carefully after ALL outdoor activities!
- The Center for Disease Control recommends that you wear bright colored clothing (to better see the ticks) and tuck your pants into your socks.

FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT.....



Information on ATV's:

- ATV's are **NOT** permitted on any roadway (paved or dirt) within the Township.
- An ATV, properly registered with the Commonwealth of PA, is permitted on roadways within the Township only during periods of emergency when declared by State, County or local government, or to cross a roadway at 90 degree angle or to cross a bridge.
- Registration and liability insurance is required for ALL ATV's operated within the Commonwealth unless the ATV is solely operated on land owned or leased by the operator.
- Operators of ATV's within the Commonwealth are *required to wear proper* protective gear to include a helmet and eye protection.
- Operators under the age of 16 are required to attend an ATV safety training course and be under the direct supervision of some one 18 years of age of older when operating an ATV on any land but that of their own.
- Fines and costs for violating any of the ATV laws can exceed \$300.00 per violation.
