From Your Supervisors....

A resignation from Brian Yeager, the Covington Township solicitor for the past fourteen (14) years, was recently accepted by the Board of Supervisors. Attorney Yeager has provided critical legal advice and expertise to the Board. His input has been exceptionally beneficial in assisting the Board decision process. We have been fortunate to have had his legal advice and knowledge for so many years.

At the May meeting, the supervisors hired Joel Wolff as their new solicitor. In addition, the Board hired Jason M. O'Malley as the solicitor for the Planning Commission.

The Board of Supervisors intend to interview and appoint several residents as alternates to the Zoning Hearing Board at the June meeting.

The Board recently notified the Golden Oaks development that the township does not intend to take ownership of the respective detention basins in their development. Ownership of such basins is the responsibility of the developer or residents.

The Voluntary Action Center recently terminated their lease with the North Pocono Senior Center. As a result, unless the township picks up the costs, services may be restricted or discontinued. Thus far, the Board of Supervisors has attempted to fund the center, but the Board is requesting some yearly assistance from other townships and boroughs within the North Pocono area. Since the center is in Covington, the Board is willing to pick up most of the expenses but additional assistance from the county and other participating communities is essential.

The Bicentennial Committee has been discussing plans for the upcoming Covington Township Bicentennial Celebration in 2018. Their next meeting will be at 7pm on June 22nd at the Moffat mansion. Please feel free to join us for our meeting. If there are any residents that may have any historical information or photos that can be included in our displays, please contact Marlene Beavers at (570) 842-7580.

The supervisors passed a mandatory trash ordinance (for the purpose of regulating trash disposal within the township). The ordinance will enable the township to apply for money to be used to upgrade our recycling program and the recycling center. Without the trash ordinance, the Department of Environmental Protection will not provide grant funding.



Child Car Seat Laws in PA

Use of proper child car seats is important for your child's safety. Pennsylvania law requires you to have your child in an appropriate car seat, or you risk a **\$75 fine**.

Follow these guidelines when buying a car seat for your child:

- **Children under 4 years old:** Use a federally approved child car seat, appropriate for the height and weight of your child.
- **Children 4 to 8 years old:** Use a booster seat until your child reaches the height and weight maximum.

Make sure you follow the manufacturer's instructions for installation and height/weight restrictions for your car seat.

Pennsylvania Seat Belt Laws

In the state of PA, if you are driving or sitting in the front seat of a car, you **must** wear your seat belt.

If you are driving with anyone under 8 to 18 years old in the vehicle, they must wear a seat belt **at all times** both in the front and back seat. Failure to do so is considered a primary offense, and as the driver, you could face the following fines:

Passengers 4 to 8 years old: \$75 fine plus court fees.

Passengers 8 to 18 years old: \$10 fine plus court fees.

From the Road Department.....

PP&L has agreed to work with the Covington Road Department in repairing roads and guiderails on township roads which may have been damaged during the construction of the power lines. Lehigh Road and A.M. Hughes Boulevard are two examples of PP&L's agreed upon cooperation.

Use of Lackawanna County's tar buggy to repair cracks in several township roads has been requested and will be put to use this summer.

The Township's 2016 Road Project will include resurfacing of Van Brunt Street from Moscow to Union Mill Road. In addition, the township is seeking a Multi-Modal Grant for the paving of Sanko Road.



It's possible to reduce your prediabetes risk or keep a diagnosis from developing into Type 2 diabetes. Start with these three lifestyle changes.

- 1. **Focus on weight loss:** Research published in the *Journal of General Internal Medicine* shows that losing 10% of your body weight (about 20 pounds for a 200 pound person) within six months of a prediabetes diagnosis can lead to an 85% reduction in the risk of developing diabetes within three years.
- 2. **Get moving:** Exercise reduces insulin resistance and lowers blood glucose levels. To minimize prediabetes risk, Larry Smith diabetes expert M. Kaye Kramer, DrPH, suggests getting 30 minutes or more of moderate-intensity exercise at least five days per week.
- 3. **Eat well:** Read nutrition labels and aim for 45 to 60 grams of carbohydrates per meal (carbs cause blood sugar levels to rise) with no more than 25% of your total daily calories from fat.

They could greatly reduce your risk of dying early. **Researchers** looked at the fruit and vegetable intake of more than 800,000 people and found those who ate five servings of fruits and vegetables per day lived the longest. Every serving of fruits or vegetables you eat each day could cut your risk of premature death by 5%, according to the study.

The Drug Epidemic

As parents, we all have many concerns related to the safety and welfare of our children. Will they have friends at school? Will they be able to handle the brazen bully? Will they do well in their studies? Will they get along well with their teachers and classmates? Such questions are but a small sample of the many typical concerns and worries that we experience as parents while our children are attending school. However, there is one topic which is not as clearly defined and perhaps not on the top of our worry list. That topic should be a more serious concern which has to do with the devastating, often life changing effects of drug use on your child's life and future.

We live in a time when the use of marijuana has become more commonplace and even acceptable to certain groups. This in itself can be very misleading to children and young adults. Couple this with marijuana's sharply increased potency and the startling increase and availability of prescription painkillers, frequently described as opioids, and you have the basics for an epidemic. Opioids were originally prescribed and promoted by doctors to treat chronic but nonmalignant conditions such as back pain and osteoarthritis. Opioids were thought to be safe and effective with no real accompanying risks. It was soon discovered that such opioids can produce drug tolerance and the need for larger doses to acquire the same effect. This cycle of craving and tolerances can lead to deadly consequences (annual deaths between 2010-2014 increased from 16,000 to 19,000). Unfortunately, the crackdown on opioid abuse has led to yet another deadly consequence. It has made heroin, which is much cheaper and more easily obtained, more popular. The result of heroin's newfound popularity has been a spike in heroin deaths between 2010-2014 (rising from 3,000 to 11,000 a year). Four out of five of those heroin addicts were hooked on opioids first. This cycle of addiction leads to a lifetime of worry, sleepless nights and endless agony for everyone involved. Even with the best intentions it is sometimes impossible to prevent.

Is disposal of old computers, televisions and electronic devices regulated by law in Pennsylvania?

YES. The Covered Device Recycling Act (CDRA) contains a "disposal ban" which went into effect on January 24, 2013. Covered devices and components are defined as: laptop and desk top computers, computer monitors and peripherals, televisions and other devices. These items may not be disposed of in a landfill but only in a certified electronic recycling facility. Landfills will refuse to accept these items.

Are cell phones included?

NO. Cell phones and other telephones are not included in the disposal ban. However, everyone is encouraged to recycle cell phones and all types of batteries at the many retail outlets which offer the service. A list of available recycling opportunities can be found at: **Call2recycle.org**.

Why is it necessary to regulate the disposal of certain electronics?

Many electronic devices in use today contain hazardous materials including cadmium, lead, mercury, lithium, phosphorus and hexavalent chromium. Given the sheer volume of electronic items in use today proper disposal and recycling is essential. Furthermore, recycling of electronic devices also reduces consumption of natural resources.

The Drug Epidemic

However, there are some things that every parent can do to minimize the chances of your child becoming a statistic.

- 1) Spend time talking to your children about the dangers and consequences of drugs.
- 2) As a parent, if you should be prescribed a pain killing drug, make sure you keep it in a safe place, use it carefully, and keep track of it. It is not uncommon for young adults and even children to bring drugs meant for their parents to school for sale or personal uses.
- Get to know the friends of your child and, if possible, 3) their parents. This will give you a good idea of the values and expectations that these parents have of their children.
- 4) Do not allow your child to stay at a friends house without meeting the parents and determining if there will be adequate adult supervision.
- 5) Closely monitor your child's grades and general performance at school. If you see a sharp change, you may want to consult your child's teachers and the school principal. They can generally provide information and keep you up to date on any problems.
- 6) If you suspect drugs or alcohol problems, do not be hesitant to attack the problem immediately. Look for signs, such as hidden items in his/her room and consult with the school. If there is a problem, the earlier you find out about it, and the quicker you intervene, the more likely you will have success. Don't be afraid or hesitant to seek outside help.
- 7) Spend time talking with your children every day and. even if immediate circumstances do not warrant it, never forget to tell them how much you love them!
