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From Your Supervisors....

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What's New in Covington Township

Lackawanna County had completed the beach at Covington Park, which was open daily over the summer from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. with life guards on duty. The beach was closed in mid-August until next season. In addition to swimming, the county park has a sheltered picnic area, a small children's area, walking trails, and an all purpose sports field. The water in DeSandis Pond, where the beach is located, is checked by the county on a regular basis for contaminants.

The road leading to the park (Sanko Road) will be receiving a coat of blacktop courtesy of an approved multi-modal grant obtained by the township.

A number of alterations are being made to the building which houses Bill's ShopRite supermarket. Dr. Haines and Dr. Pacyna's offices, along with the architectural offices, have moved to the back building and in their place, the Wine and Spirits store will be relocated. The current location of the Wine and Spirits store is expected to become an expanded Bill's Café separate from the grocery store.

The Board of Supervisors, at a June special meeting which preceded their regular meeting, approved a recommended zoning change for the property directly behind Nammo from MP-RV to M1. With the change, Nammo intends to eventually expand its operation to include additional work space and personnel. The change in zone was unanimously approved by the board at their public hearing.

The construction of an automatic and self service automobile wash facility adjacent to Peebles Department Store in Bill's Plaza has begun and should be completed in early September.



Upon the final review of the Planning Commission and approval of the Board of Supervisors, the construction of a specialty shop containing a bakery and coffee shop is expected at the corner of Route 502 and Route 435. Restaurant seating and a drive through availability are likely to be part of the facility.

We have received many inquiries and questions regarding the construction of an entrance/exit driveway on a parcel of land next to Kay's Restaurant on Route 435. Although there has been much speculation at to what the developer has planned, I can assure you, at this time, no proposals have been submitted to the township for approval. As part of the approval process, any development requires an approved entrance/ exit to the proposed development by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (Penn DOT).

In less than two years, Covington Township plans to hold a celebration to mark its bicentennial. Township Supervisor, Marlene Beavers plans to hold a series of events highlighting the townships inception and focusing on before and



after pictures of the township. Ted Baird, a township resident and member of the Lackawanna Historical Society, is seeking old picture albums, journals, diaries, and artifacts. The continued county funding of the North Pocono Senior Center is looking more positive. Supervisors John Brostoski and Thomas Yerke have been working with county representatives relative to funding for the center. In any case, Chairman Petrosky has noted that even with assistance from the county, the center will not be funded completely. As a result, the township has sent letters to neighboring communities asking for a small yearly donation. Most costs not completely funded by the county will be handled by Covington Township with hopefully some help from neighboring communities from which residents use the facility.

Three township residents, Glenn Khoury, Roslyn Davis, and Charles Raziano, have been appointed as Alternates on the Zoning Hearing Board.

What you should know about deficits and the national debt before it becomes an out of control crisis

Quite often we hear various figures being thrown around by politicians relative to the state and health of our economy. Numbers related to our national debt are frequently mentioned. To effectively understand this matter, it is essential to understand the difference between deficit spending and the national debt. Deficit spending simply means the particular government entity (local, state or federal) is spending more each year than they are acquiring in revenue from taxes or other sources. To cover the shortfall (deficit), the national government issues interest baring certificates (bonds). When you add all the shortfalls (deficits) over the years you arrive at a figure which represents the national debt of the United States Government. Currently, this accumulated debt is approximately nineteen trillion dollars (~\$19,000,000,000,000.00). The U.S. Government has agreed to pay back, with interest, those individuals and countries that have purchased the debt certificates. Normally, however, the government pays the holders of debt certificates back by issuing more debt certificates. (They issue additional debt to pay the debt which is reaching maturity.) So, in any one year, the government is issuing new debt to cover the yearly deficit and additional debt to cover that portion of the debt reaching maturity.

There are two primary concerns or fears that result from these practices:

 In the near future, the interest alone on the debt will soon become the third (3rd) largest expenditure of the United States Government. As a result, the government's ability to finance essential programs (defense, infrastructure needs, education and other society needs) will be extremely compromised.

Everything you need to know about Pennsylvania's Young Driver Law

Pennsylvania licenses young drivers through a three-stage program, reflecting the driver's gradual progression in skill, experience, and decision-making ability.

LEARNER'S PERMIT

After successfully completing a physical examination, vision screening and knowledge test, young drivers may begin behind-the-wheel practice. Basic driving skills and safe habits are developed under adult supervised conditions. Requirements under the law include:

• <u>Learner's permit valid for one year</u>: The learner's permit will be valid for one year with extensions for those requiring more practice time.

• <u>Scheduling your skills test</u>: Penn DOT encourages students to schedule their road test for their earliest eligibility date printed on their learner's permit at the time their permit is issued.

• <u>Six months of learning</u>: A six-month skill-building period to practice and gain experience is required before a young driver may take the road test for a junior license.

• <u>Proper supervision</u>: You must be accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 21 years of age or a parent, guardian, person in loco parentis or spouse who is at least 18 years of age and licensed with the same or higher class vehicle that appears on your learner's permit.

• <u>Skills requirements</u>: 65 hours of adult-supervised skill building. Except for a motorcycle learners permit, this requirement includes no less than ten hours of nighttime driving and five (5) hours of bad weather driving. A parent or guardian must certify (Parent or Guardian Certification Form (DL-180C)) that the young driver's six months of skill building included at least 65 hours of practical, adult supervised driving experience.

• <u>Nighttime driving restriction</u>: The young driver may not be behind the wheel between the hours of 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. Young drivers may travel for employment and for volunteer or charitable service during these hours, but they must carry proper documentation.

• <u>Passenger limitation</u>: The number of passengers must not exceed the number of seat belts in the vehicle. This applies to all drivers under age 18.

• <u>Required sanctions for high-risk drivers under age 18</u>: A young driver's permit will be suspended for 90 days if he or she accumulates six or more points or is convicted of a single high-speed violation (driving 26 miles per hour or more over the posted speed limit).

For Your Better Health.....

Did you know eating more fruits and vegetables could add years to your life? Vitamin C may be the reason. A study of 100,000 people found that those who ate two daily servings each of fruits and vegetables and who had the highest levels of vitamin C in their blood were 20% less likely to die early than those with low vitamin C levels and low fruit and vegetable intake. Bell peppers, kale, tomatoes, and broccoli are C-rich veggies. Black cherries, oranges, grapefruit, and peaches are vitamin C-packed fruits.

Whether you get it from your kids, your career, or volunteer work, a sense of meaning in life can protect your heart. Researchers analyzed studies that followed more than 137,000 people for about nine years. The studies tracked whether the people died, how they died, and whether they reported having a sense of purpose. During the study period, the more purpose-driven people were 23% less likely to die of any cause and 19% less likely to have a heart attack or stroke, or to need bypass surgery or cardiac stenting.

This could simply happen if, for some reason, the government was unable to sell new or additional debt certificates. With such a massive debt needing to be refinanced periodically and with additional debt being accumulated yearly (resulting from deficits), it is not unthinkable that this could happen and, as the debt increases, it becomes increasingly probable each year.

In any case, there are many wiser people than me who strongly believe it is time to get the debt under control. The problem is how can this best be accomplished? There are those who feel we should raise taxes to cover the deficit and others who feel we should reduce spending. Keep in mind if you cut spending, there are programs and individuals who will be adversely affected and, of course, if you raise taxes, there are many people who feel they are already overtaxed.

Lackawanna County would like to inform property owners that it is accepting requests for spraying for gypsy moth caterpillars in the Spring of 2017.

Lackawanna County is cooperating with the PA Department of Conservation & Natural Recourses-Bureau of Forestry in a joint effort to spray gypsy moth caterpillars next year in certain residential & public high use areas within the County. Treatment locations will be selected on the basis of resident requests and subsequent surveys. No treatment areas have been determined.

• Motorcycle license requirements: Successful completion of a Pennsylvania Motorcycle Safety Program Basic Rider Course is a requirement for a young rider before a motorcycle license can be issued.

JUNIOR LICENSE

Young drivers who graduate to a junior license have satisfactorily completed all learner's permit requirements, including the road test, but the following restrictions still apply:

• Required sanctions for high-risk drivers under age 18: A young driver's junior license will be suspended for 90 days if he or she accumulates six or more points or is convicted of a single high speed violation (driving 26 miles per hour or more over the posted speed limit).

• Nighttime driving restriction begins at 11 p.m.: Even with a junior license, a young driver may not be behind the wheel between the hours of 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. Exceptions for employment and volunteer or charitable service will apply, but young drivers must carry proper documentation regarding their need to travel. 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PA's Young Driver Law

 Seatbelt requirements: The number of passengers must not exceed the number of seat belts in the vehicle, and all seatbelts must be worn. This applies to all passengers and drivers under the age of 18. What You Need To Know About Pennsylvania's March 2015 Young Driver Law

• Passenger restrictions: You may not carry more than one (1) passenger under the age of 18 who is not an immediate family member unless one (1) of your parents or guardians is in the vehicle with you. After the first six (6) months of driving on a junior license, the limit is increased to no more than three (3) passengers under the age of 18 who are not immediate family members unless one (1) of your parents or guardians is in the vehicle with you. The increased limit does not apply to any junior driver who has ever been involved in a crash in which you were partially or fully responsible or who is convicted of any driving violation.

UNRESTRICTED LICENSE

A regular driver's license - typically issued at age 18 - provides unrestricted driving privileges to teenagers who have progressed through the graduated system and have an established history of safe driving, If certain conditions are met, some young drivers may qualify early for a license before age 18.

 Unrestricted license before age 18: A young driver cannot obtain an unrestricted license before age 18 unless he or she has maintained a crash-and conviction-free record for 12 months and has completed an approved driver's education course. To apply for an unrestricted license before age 18, young drivers must complete a special form, DL-59, and submit it to Penn DOT along with a certificate of completion from an approved driver's education course, An affidavit of consent from a parent, guardian, person in loco parentis or spouse who is at least 18 years of age must also be provided.

 Passenger limitation: The number of passengers must not exceed the number of seat belts in the vehicle. This applies to all drivers under age 18.

 Required sanctions for high-risk drivers under age 18: A young driver's unrestricted license will be suspended for 90 days if he or she accumulates six or more points or is convicted of a single high-speed violation (driving 26 miles per hour or more over the posted speed limit).

What are the basic penalties for illegal littering, posting, or trash dumping?

A person who causes any waste, trash or detrimental substance to be deposited on any roadway or land of another commits a summary offense with a fine of between \$50.00 and \$300.00 plus costs. Attaching or posting any advertisement on the property of another without first obtaining written consent of the owner is also a summary offense under the Pennsylvania Crimes Code. A person who interferes with or disturbs the contents of any waste receptacle can be guilty of a third degree misdemeanor with a fine of between \$300.00 and \$1,000.00 plus costs. An owner operator or agent of a debris collection vehicle who knowingly causes any part of the load to be deposited upon any road or the land of another is guilty of a second degree misdemeanor with a fine of between \$500.00 and \$5,000.00. All of these offenses carry the possibility of jail time.

Are there other Pennsylvania Laws that can prevent littering or illegal trash dumping?

Yes. Such conduct might be determined to be a public nuisance under the Crimes Code which is a misdemeanor of the second degree. There is also legal precedent in Pennsylvania for convicting illegal trash dumpers of the crime of theft of services. In Wesleyville Borough, Erie County, people had dumped old furniture, mattresses, tires, computers, chemicals, paint, etc., at the Borough's Recycling Center all in violation of the posted rules. When the violators were caught with the use of surveillance cameras, 18 individuals were found guilty of theft of services under Section 3926 of the Pennsylvania Crimes Code. The grading of this offense ranges from a summary offense all the way up to felony offenses based upon the amount of services that have been misappropriated by the illegal dumper.

How can Pennsylvania communities prevent illegal dumping?

Pennsylvania communities rely upon their local police departments and the Pennsylvania State Police and citizen reporting to enforce all Pennsylvania Laws against illegal dumping. In addition, in 2015 Pennsylvania began a program that provides the loan of high quality surveillance cameras and training to Pennsylvania municipalities and community groups to help them fight illegal dumping. Since then there have been over 30 convictions involving Pennsylvania communities, state forests and recycling drop-off centers across the state.
