From Your Supervisors

The Board of Supervisors has taken action on a number of matters including the following:

- The bridge on Langan Road has been damaged and as a result, Langan Road between Union Mill Street and Buena Vista Drive has been closed until repairs or a bridge replacement can be completed.
- After repeated unsuccessful attempts to prevent dumping and the accumulation of garbage at the Salvation Army box site on Route 435, the supervisors have notified the Salvation Army to remove the boxes from the site and discontinue the service. Any further dumping of garbage or junk by individuals will result in appropriate legal action. This area will be patrolled by our police department.
- As the township has done in past years, they entered a separate contract with Eagle Lake to provide police services, particularly on weekends.
- There were two proposals submitted by companies seeking state approval for medical marijuana producing facilities in Covington Township. Neither company received a state permit, thus at this time, there will be no facilities within the township.
- The supervisors directed the Zoning Officer to modify the Zoning Ordinance and submit a proposal to restrict the size and duration of election signs within the township.
- The Board of Supervisors approved a request of the Covington Fire Company to review, as part of the permit process, Commercial floor plans and to also have a set of plans for commercial buildings on file.
- The spring fishing derby was reasonably successful and included a total of forty six students under the age of fifteen.
- The supervisors accepted a report from the Recreation committee regarding the upcoming bicentennial, summer party and fishing derby.

It's Back To School Time Again

Although I have been working with and to some extent, monitoring young men and women for most of my life, I do not in any way consider myself to be an expert on adolescents and adolescent behavior. However, with the school year just beginning, there are a few suggestions I have which may save you some future agony, turmoil and often accompanying disappointment.

1. Don't fail to tell your child or children every day that you love them and don't forget to include some encouraging words.

2. Establish everyday chores and/or requirements that you expect your children to accomplish.

- 3. Develop specific daily family time when you can discuss the days events with your child (Perhaps dinner or when they first get home from school).
- 4. Regardless of your child's age, make sure you establish a specific time for homework, studying and within reason, a reasonable bedtime.
- 5. Be exceptionally cautious about the general behavior and attitudes of your child's friends. Get to know them and, if possible, their parents. Don't be hesitant to invite them to your home or at least speak with them.
- 6. Although children are growing and becoming more mature, particularly as they enter the late middle school and the early years of high school which will certainly generate noticeable personality changes. You should be on the lookout for changes in grades, sharp changes in attitudes and possibly friendships.

- 7. If you should suspect any type of alcohol or drug abuse, immediately make an appointment to talk with your child's school guidance counselor, teacher or administrator. Generally speaking, they are in an excellent position to carefully observe relationships, potential problems and give you solid feedback.
- 8. Keep your focus on social networking, FaceBook, SnapChat, Instagram, etc. (see article on page 5)
- 9. Don't be fooled or misinterpret statements which include when your child says that everyone is doing it or everyone has a particular item. Everyone or everybody - i.e. Everyone is going, Everyone has one, Everybody does this, Everyone is allowed. When your child starts a statement with "everyone", you can generally be assured that is likely an exaggeration.

Remember, as a parent, you have every right and a responsibility to know where your children are, who they are with and what they are doing. Although initially, this may lead to a few negative interactions, in the long run, your children will thank you.

School Bus Traffic Laws

As the summer comes to an end a new school years begins. This means additional vehicles will be on the roadway as you make your commute to and from work each day. It is important to pay close attention to the other vehicles as you travel to your destinations, especially when approaching a school bus. *Here are some reminders to ensure the safety for all when approaching a stopped or slowing school bus*:

- 1. When approaching a stopped school bus with red lights and a stop sign/arm activated, you must stop. This goes for BOTH directions.
- 2. You must wait until the flashing lights and stop sign/ arm are deactivated before continuing on your way.
- 3. When approaching or overtaking a slowing school bus with amber lights activated, you may pass with caution and be prepared to stop.
- 4. A school bus operator may report any violation to the local authorities. The violator may then be charged accordingly. The violation does not have to be witnessed by a Law Enforcement Officer.
- A violation of this section will result in a fine of \$250.00 as well as 5 points against the operator's driver's license.

Every year, multiple children are killed or seriously injured due to school bus violations. These violations are avoidable and should be taken very seriously. Please use caution when approaching a school bus at all times.

The Covington Twp. Police Department is also happy to announce the addition of a 2017 Dodge Charger to the fleet of patrol vehicles. The new vehicle was recently put into service at the end of July.

How Old Glory Got Its Name



A number of you may have heard a part of the story of the "old sea captain", and how that name has become known as a synonym for the flag of the United States. Have you ever wondered why a sea captain naming his flag "Old Glory" would make that name a synonym for our flag?

William Driver from Salem, Massachusetts, a sea captain, was to take command of his first merchant ship. On his 21st birthday, his mother presented him with a twenty star flag made for him by his mother and his lady friends. Accepting the flag, Driver thanked them and said that he was naming the flag his "Old Glory".

Driver carried his flag around the world during his sea career. When he retired from the sea, Driver took his flag to his retirement home in Nashville, Tennessee where he flew it on patriotic occasions. The Captain's wife and daughter reworked

the flag, updated it to 34 stars, and put an anchor denoting his sea service in the lower right hand corner.

When Tennessee seceded from the Union in 1861, Driver hid his flag from the Confederates by sewing it inside of his comforter. Gary & Marion Kane Union forces entered Nashville on February 28th, 1862, Driver met them and took a Union Captain to his home where he tore open the comforter and showed him his flag.

Driver escorted by a group of Union soldiers took his flag to the statehouse. He climbed to the dome and raised his flag over the city. As he did, he was reported to have said: "Thank God I have lived to raise "Old Glory" on the dome of the capitol of Tennessee. I am now ready to die and go to my forefathers." Until that moment, the term "Old Glory" was simply Driver's personal name for his flag. The publicity surrounding his action brought him fame, and gave national recognition to his private nickname.

Thereafter, "Old Glory" was recognized as a synonym for the United States Flag. "Old Glory" measured 9 feet 5 inches by 17 feet. It is now in the Smithsonian Institute. And that, compatriots, is the rest of the story.

Socíal Networkíng May be Great, But How Do

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Your Kids Safe?

Social networking sites help all of us stay connected to family and friends. However, it's important to make sure your child knows how to be safe while online.

You want your child to be safe, but it's challenging to keep up with this ever-changing technology. You may also feel like your child is much more internet-savvy than you are. Still, as savvy as your teen may be, he or she may not be fully aware of the dangers of online networking and the precautions they need to take.

The following information from the National Crime Prevention Council will help you better understand social networking and enable you to talk to your teen about staying safe.

The *four major dangers* of using social networking websites and apps are:

1. Oversharing information -

When creating a profile page, most social networking sites will ask for personal information, such as a home address, birth date, and phone numbers. If the page's privacy settings aren't set correctly, this information will be made public to anyone who visits the user's profile page. Keep in mind that even if the account settings are set to the strictest privacy settings, users are still at risk of having their accounts hacked. The biggest threat of oversharing, though, is identity theft, which can happen in obvious and not-so-obvious ways. An obvious way would be someone asking for a Social Security number. A not-so-obvious way is luring a user to click on a link that allows the criminal to download the user's personal information. The anonymity provided online makes it easier for computer criminals to go undetected.

The Opioid Epidemic...A Very Brief History

Opioids are highly addictive narcotic medications generally used by physicians to control or moderate pain. In 1979, a Boston University School of Medicine Doctor, Hershel Jick, studied a database on the number of patients who had developed an addiction after being given narcotic painkillers. His conclusion stated that of the twelve thousand patients using opioids while in the hospital, only four had become addicted. No other data was provided. This study was subsequently published in the prestigious New England Journal of Medicine. The study set into motion a series of events in which pharmaceutical companies out to capture a share of this potential financial bonanza, began to heavily market the opioids to doctors who were told of its non-addictive properties. Unfortunately, over time, the massive increase in prescriptions and misuse of the powerful drugs fueled an ever growing increase in addicts. In certain parts of the country unethical practices were used to market the drugs. Pill mills were opened and operated by unscrupulous physicians, many of whom provided prescriptions for money. A two hundred dollar (\$200) limited examination would get you a prescription for sixty or more opioid pills which could be used or resold at a profit. The number of addicts and deaths began to climb rapidly. In the United States, today there are over one hundred (100) deaths from overdoses every day.

The peculiar fact is we now have an epidemic in which every pill is legitimately purchased, legitimately filled by a pharmacist and legitimately paid for by the recipients. For the first time since heroin was invented, the root of the epidemic was not street gangs or drug mafia but doctors and drug companies. Over time the high cost of obtaining the legitimate drugs and the decreased street availability has led to a cheaper more powerful illegal replacement known as Black Tar Heroin direct from Mexico. As a result, we now have neighbors, students, friends and people from all walks of life and every imaginable background addicted to prescriptive and illegal drugs. Not only is the person who is addicted suffering, but family and friends also suffer.

After recently finishing the book entitled *Dreamland* by Sam Quinones, I encourage those of you who desire to learn more and fully understand this menace to pick up a copy. It is a haunting and eye opening examination of the devastation of opioid abuse across America.

Remember: Talk to your children, know where they are, who they are with and what they are doing.

SUPPORTING OUR VETERANS

FROM: CHOICE to CARE

VA Secretary David Shulkin has offered a replacement for the poorly designed and managed Choice program, which was enacted in a rush in 2014 to try to improve access to private- sector Health care when Veterans are denied timely, convenient services in VA facilities.

The Choice plan allows Veterans to use VA contracted civilian provider networks if they live more Than 40 miles from VA primary care or must wait longer than 30 days for an appointment. The New Veteran Coordinated Access and Rewarding Experiences (CARE) program would scrap Those restrictions, which Congress passed only to hold down costs.

But CARE also has familiar features of managed care. Enrolled patients would be empaneled To VA primary care physicians who would control access to private- sector care based on Clinical needs and the health-care goals and desires of patients. Also, for the first time, VA Would offer urgent care or walk-in clinics, which Veterans could use at no charge two times A year and be charged thereafter \$50 per visit.

An obituary printed in the NY Times.....

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain:
- Why the early bird gets the worm;
- Life isn't always fair;
- And maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a six year old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student. only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children. It declines even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches become businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims.

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for the assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death,

- By his parents, Truth and Trust,
- By his wife, Discretion,
- By his daughter, Responsibility,
- And by his son, Reason.

He is survived by his 5 stepbrothers;

- I Know My Rights
- I Want It Now
- Someone Else Is To Blame •
- I'm A Victim
- Pay Me for Doing Nothing

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone.

COMMONLY ASKED Legal questions

What is identity theft?

Identity theft happens when someone steals your personal information and uses it without your permission. The theft of your information can be made from your internet activities or from an ordinary paper trail, credit card receipts, bank statements, etc.

How do thieves get information about your identity?

It is well publicized that some identity theft occurs from massive hacking events. However, even people who work for legitimate businesses can steal personal information which they can access through their employment at various businesses, medical offices or government agencies. Of course, there is also the danger of physical theft of your wallet, purse, mail or other items that show your personal information.

How can you protect your information?

You should proofread your bank statements, credit card statements, and all other loan or account statements immediately upon receiving them. It is also a good idea to go online and check your credit card statement on a more frequent basis. You should shred all documents that show any personal, financial or medical information before disposing of them. As to your internet activities, you should not respond to any messages that seek personal information because legitimate companies will not ask for such information. Don't click on any links in an email message unless you are absolutely certain that it is a legitimate link from a legitimate sender. Often times even the email accounts of your friends and acquaintances can be hacked and massive emails sent out bearing their seemingly legitimate email names. You should always keep anti-virus and anti-spyware and firewall up to date on your computer and always update to your browsers latest operating system.

What can be done once your identity is stolen?

You can call one of the nationwide credit reporting companies and ask that a "fraud alert" be placed on your credit report. The company that you call will contact the other two national companies who will also put fraud alerts on your files. This first reporting of a fraud alert is good for 90 days. You can get a free credit report every

personal injury claims, trials, family law, business law, real estate, title insurance, wills and estates 12 months from each of the 3 nationwide credit reporting agencies. Each report may be slightly different. If you see any mistakes or signs of fraud communicate with the agency. Finally, you have the right to remove fraudulent information from your credit report and stop a debt collection company that is relying upon fraudulent information or identity theft. This is done by creating an Identity Theft Report by filing a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission at ftc.gov/complaint or calling them at 1-877-438-4338.

- Falling for a fake identity Social networking sites make it very easy to pretend to be someone else.
- Sharing your location It can also increase their vulnerability, potentially opening them up to being robbed, sexually assaulted or worse since predators use this to track your teen's movements and determine when they are alone.
- 4. <u>Posting photos</u> Photo editing tools allow people to manipulate online images in any way they choose, whether for good or bad.

Encourage your teens to follow these three simple

safety tips:

- 1. **Don't provide optional information.** When creating a profile, it's not necessary to enter all of the requested information.
- Don't be an open book. Profiles have three levels of privacy, "open to everyone", "open to friends of friends", and being "open to friends only". "Open to friends only" is the strictest level of security. This ensures that only the people your teen has accepted as a friend can view his or her information.
- 3. Do accept "friends" but only people you know. This will help to protect your teen from spammers, pedophiles, and others who use social networking sites to commit crimes.
